**House Bill 633- Hospital Credentialing - Reappointment Process for Physician Staff -  
Modification**

**MHA Position**

On behalf of the Maryland Hospital Association's (MHA) 60 member hospitals and health systems, we appreciate the opportunity to comment in support of House Bill 633.

Maryland is facing a critical staffing shortage across health care occupations. MHA's [2022 State of Maryland's Health Care Workforce report](#) outlines a roadmap to ensure Maryland has the health care workforce it needs now and into the future.

Hospitals are required by state law to establish a credentialing process for physicians as a condition of licensure.<sup>1</sup> The law requires a formal written reappointment process every two years. HB 633 would change this requirement to align state law with the standards of The Joint Commission, which is the accrediting body for hospitals.

Recently, The Joint Commission [changed](#) the credentialing time frame for practitioners working in hospitals from two years to at least three years.<sup>2</sup> According to The Joint Commission, this change aligns with the standard practice of evaluating licensed practitioners every three years. In recent meetings, representatives from The Joint Commission shared that this change should save time and money, especially for large health care systems. However, only states with statutes that defer to The Joint Commission's timelines can benefit. If HB 633 does not pass, Maryland hospitals will not be able to benefit from this extension at a time when they need it the most.

This legislation ensures that if the recommended credentialing timeline changes, Maryland hospitals can be nimble and adjust their practices rather than have to request a statutory fix.

For these reasons, we request a *favorable* report on HB 633.
